After the procedure, most women report mild abdominal discomfort for the next day or two after the procedure. Usually, ibuprofen reduces pain, but occasionally prescription strength pain medication in needed.
How much bleeding will I have?	Bleeding usually lasts from 9-16 days, but it may last for as long as 3 weeks. Bleeding is usually heavier than that of a normal menstrual period.	Bleeding usually lasts 5-7 days, but may last for as long as 3 weeks after the procedure. Usually, the heaviest bleeding is no heavier than that of a normal menstrual period.
Will I pass blood clots?	Most women pass blood clots as part of the medical abortion procedure. With this process blood clots may range in size from very small to the size of a golf ball or lemon.	Passing blood clots the size of a half dollar or smaller is normal with this procedure.
Will I miss work or school?	After taking the Mifeprex pill, most women are able to go about their normal activities. However, after inserting the misoprostol tablets vaginally, you should plan to stay at home with no responsibilities (such as child care, work, school) for the next 2 to 3 days.	The day of the procedure you should plan to rest afterwards. Most women are able to return to work or school the day after the procedure as long as you don't lift a lot, or walk a lot.
